

MAJESTIC DETAINED FOR HOURS BY TIDE

**Ebb Flow So Strong Big Liner
Adopts Caution to Guard
Against Accidents.**

R. C. VANDERBILTS SAIL

**Newly Married Couple Off for Visit
to Bride's Parents—Dr. Butler
Goes Abroad to Lecture.**

The White Star liner Majestic, bound for Cherbourg and Southampton with 1,320 passengers, was detained at her pier for three hours and a half yesterday by the strong ebb tide rushing down the Hudson River, and it was 3:30 P. M. before Captain Sir Bertram Hayes, the master of the big ship, deemed it wise to cast off the lines and back out. He said that the delay would cause the Majestic to miss the early afternoon tide at Southampton next Friday, but she would dock later in the evening. Passengers would land at Cherbourg in the forenoon and reach Paris in time for luncheon, he said.

The officials of the International Mercantile Marine Company had to choose between sailing the ship at 10 A. M. or 3 P. M. and hoped to get away at 2 o'clock, but the tide was too strong to take any risks of breaking up the pier or damaging other vessels.

Among the first cabin passengers who arrived late were Mr. and Mrs. Reginald Vanderbilt who was formerly Miss Gloria Morgan. The bride looked very well and said she had recovered entirely from her attack of diphtheria. The photographers had been waiting hours to snap the newly married couple, but only two of them succeeded in getting a picture.

Will Visit Bride's Parents.

Mrs. Vanderbilt wore a black crepe skirt with a waist of the same material trimmed with ermine, and a black mushroom Leghorn hat. Mr. Vanderbilt said their stay in Europe would be indefinite and they would tour through France and Switzerland after visiting the bride's parents, Consul General and Mrs. H. H. Morgan, in Brussels. Mrs. William K. Vanderbilt Jr. was also a passenger, with her two daughters, Muriel and Consuelo, and said she was going to spend a month in Paris.

Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, President of Columbia University, sailed with his wife and daughter and said he expected to be away about ten weeks. He will deliver a series of lectures before British institutions, his first to be given in London at the Mansion House on Thursday, May 24, on "Forerunners of the Nation."

Mme. Frieda Hempel, the soprano, formerly with the Metropolitan Opera Company, left on the Majestic to give a Jenny Lind concert in London and will then go to her villa in the Engadine for the Summer.

William H. Todd, head of the Todd Shipyards Corporation, sailed for Southampton accompanied by his family, to attend conferences in London with the manager of the company in Great Britain and inspect the Todd oilburners which have just been installed on the new liner Mongolia of the Peninsular and Oriental Navigation Company for the Australian trade. Mr. Todd said he expected to visit the principal shipyards on the other side and expected to return in June. He also hopes to see the Derby race at Epsom on May 23.

Miss Dressler Likes Fascisti.

Marie Dressler, the comedienne, sailed for Italy, where she will spend the Summer. She said that Mussolini was the only Premier that had adopted the American baseball bat as the emblem of authority. No one who has seen them can fail to admire the young Fascisti who have brought order into Italy and made the lazzaroni work, she said.

The Majestic had 552 first, 415 second and 352 third-class passengers and 6,000 sacks of mail.
